

For our SEED students, this "human beings sharing a space" orientation means that you are cared for and supported by a literal forest (yeah, I can't resist those nature references—we are the "seed" program after all (3)) of folks. Mathilde is in the SEED office always at the ready with answers to your questions. Andrew plays point for those general advising issues. Lisa and Amanda will take care of every clinical experience need you have. Mary is there for content area reviews, and Jennifer for licensure affairs. And then, of course, you have Erin, Theresa, Lynda, Kaya, and me (aka Dr. Peters-Burton, Dr. Wills, Dr. Kaya, Dr. Herrera, and Dr. Zenkov) as your lead subject area advisors and faculty.

Rory Dippold, PhD



What is your role in the SEED Program?

I have mainly taught the Foundations of Secondary Education course (SEED 522) and the Human Development and Learning course (SEED 540), but have also taught SEED 567 and 675. I have served as a Clinical Coach for 4 students.

Why did you want to pursue a career in education? I was not an education major in my undergraduate studies, but really enjoyed working with young adults throughout my college experiences. While I have a strong desire to inspire, influence and impact students, I soon realized that I learn so much from them and it fosters my interest to be a lifelong learner.

Professional/Research interests?

Project-based learning, self-regulation learning, history and social studies education, International Baccalaureate Programme, teacher efficacy.

Where do you work when you are not supporting the SEED Program?

I am the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (MYP) Coordinator in Falls Church City Public Schools. I split my time between the middle and high school.

Content area/specialization: I am passionate about mentoring, teacher induction, and professional development. My prior focus was in Secondary English, but over the last several years I have shifted to interdisciplinary practices and pedagogical development.

What is your role in the SEED Program? Normally in the SEED program I teach Seminar, Research, and serve as a Clinical Coach, but I honestly never really know. Since 2020, each semester is like a new adventure!

Why did you want to pursue a career in education? Since I was a kid, I have always loved helping others and also supporting them in discovering and developing their strengths. Teaching felt like such a natural fit.

State Licensure Exam Preparation

Individuals seeking a Virginia State Teaching License will need to pass the Virginia Communication and Literacy Skills Exam (VCLA) as well as a Praxis II exam in their content area. Read the following section to get some tips on how to succeed on these two exams.



Tip 1: Take practice tests for both exams as soon as possible to see how you do. The earlier you can start this process, the easier it will be to finish the program.

Tip 2: After taking practice tests, identify the specific areas where you need to study.

Tip 3: If you would like some additional help with general test-taking strategies, you are encouraged to make an appointment with **Learning Services** here at GMU (https://learningservices.gmu.edu). You can also email them at lsstaff@gmu.edu

Tip 4: if you would like some additional help with general writing skills, or the VCLA specifically, you are encouraged to bring a writing sample to: **The Writing Center** here at GMU
(https://writingcenter.gmu.edu). If you have already taken the VCLA, bring a writing sample (both the summary and composition) to the writing center, and ask to meet with someone once a week to work on this skill.

Tip 5: As soon as you feel ready, take the exams! The sooner you pass the exams the easier it will be to plan your courses.


SEED Research Sequence

All SEED students pursuing a M.Ed. need to take research.

SEED Students pursuing a M.Ed. need 3 credits in the research course. These 3 credits may be divided between semesters depending on your individual needs. If you're graduating with a bachelor's degree this December, please take note of the following deadlines:

- August 28: Fill out the BAM transition form and sign it. (It's a policy that you
 must sign it by the add deadline this fall which is Aug. 28th).
- **Before September 15:** Obtain your Undergraduate Advisor's approval and signature.
- **September 15:** Submit the signed form to your Graduate Advisor and cc Mathilde Speier (mspeier@gmu.edu).
- September 30: Apply for bachelor's degree graduation.

Next steps in the process:

- After your Graduate Advisor has signed off on your BAM Transition Form, our SAA Office will forward it to the Office of Graduate Admissions.
- You will then receive a new admissions letter in your graduate admissions selfservice portal, where you initially applied for the BAM program.
- In the weeks following your form submission, please check your email for a message from the admissions office offering you full admission to the MEd program.
- To complete your admission, you'll need to confirm your enrollment through the portal.

SEED Internship News

The Internship experience is the capstone of the SEED Program. While working with Mentor Teachers (MTs) and Clinical Coaches (CCs), SEED Interns gradually transition to providing instruction full-time during their 15-week practicum. The SEED Internship is offered each Fall semester and each Spring semester. The SEED Internship does not occur in summer terms.
