## Secondary Curriculum and Strategies for Students with Disabilities Who Access the General Education Curriculum

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#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Applies research on teacher effectiveness, accountability, and instructional approaches at the secondary level for individuals with mild disabilities. Includes instructional methods necessary for teaching reading, writing, math, and other content areas across the curriculum.

#### Student Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of the federal and state laws that require and provide for instructional services for students with disabilities. (As evidenced via a quiz or application).
- Demonstrate the ability to develop lesson plans and a nine-week unit that includes instructional strategies and adaptations for students with disabilities at the secondary level. (As evidenced in the curriculum unit, signature assignment.)
- Identify and infuse into the curriculum differentiation strategies for successfully including students with disabilities at the secondary level in both regular (math, science, social studies, English, etc.) and special education classroom environments. (As evidenced in the curriculum unit, signature assignment.)
- Demonstrate the ability to assess, plan for, and address the content area literacy needs of students with disabilities who are accessing the general curriculum. (As evidenced in the curriculum unit, signature assignment.)
- Develop Individual Education Plans that successfully address the needs of secondary students with disabilities. (As evidenced in the IEP assignment.)
- Identify research efforts, organizations, services, networks, and the variety of state and local resources aimed at dropout prevention and improving the outcomes of secondary students with disabilities. Quiz.

Relationship of Courses to Program Goals and Professional Organizations

This course is part of the George Mason University, Graduate School of Education, Special Education Program for teacher licensure in the Commonwealth of Virginia in the special education areas of Emotional Disturbance and Learning Disabilities, and Mental Retardation. This program complies with the standards for teacher licensure

established by the Council for Exceptional Children, the major special education professional organization. As such, the learning objectives for this course cover many of the competencies for secondary curriculum and strategies for teaching individuals with emotional disturbances, learning disabilities, and mild mental retardation.

This course will incorporate the evidence-based practices (EBPs) relevant to secondary curriculum, learning strategies, and content area planning, and designing a secondary IEP. Evidence for the selected research-based practices is informed by meta-analysis, literature reviews/synthesis, the technical assistance networks which provide web-based resources, and the national organizations whose mission is to support students with disabilities. We address both promising and emerging practices in the field of special education. This course will provide opportunities for students to take an active, decision-making role to thoughtfully select, modify, apply, and evaluate EBPs in order to improve outcomes for students with disabilities.

- Design learning environments that encourage active participation in individual and group activities.
- Modify the learning environment to manage behaviors.
- Use performance data and information from all stakeholders to make or suggest modifications in learning environments.
- Establish and maintain rapport with individuals with and without exceptional learning needs.
- Teach self-advocacy.
- Create an environment that encourages self-advocacy and increased independence.
- Use effective and varied behavior management strategies.

- Use the least intensive behavior management strategy consistent with the needs of the individual with exceptional learning needs.
- Design and manage daily routines.
- Organize, develop, and sustain learning environments that support positive intracultural and intercultural experiences.
- Mediate controversial intercultural issues among students within the learning environment in ways that enhance any culture, group, or person.
- Structure, direct, and support the activities of paraeducators, volunteers, and tutors.
- Use universal precautions.

- Prepare individuals to exhibit self-enhancing behavior in response to societal attitudes & actions.

- The major portion of student learning in this course will be the result of the student's **personal involvement** in the content provided and the willingness to incorporate in-class content and the readings into their repertoire of knowledge and skills. The professor's role in student learning is to be a facilitator and to provide a favorable environment in which learning can take place; however, the major responsibility must necessarily remain with each individual student.

#### STUDENT EXPECTATIONS:

- Attendance. Students are expected to (a) attend all classes during the course, (b) arrive on time, (c) stay for the duration of the class time and (d) complete all assignments. Attendance at all sessions, timeliness, and professionally relevant, active participation are expected for a grade of B or better. Attendance at all sessions is very important because many of the activities in class are planned in such a way that they cannot necessarily be recreated outside of the class session.
- Workload. In-depth reading, study, and work on course requirements require outside class time. Students are expected
  to allot approximately three hours for class study and preparation for each credit hour weekly in addition to papers and
  assignments.
- Writing. APA guidelines are required for all course assignments. This website links to APA
  format guidelines. {http://www.apastyle.apa.org}. Person-first language will be used in class discussions and written
  assignments (and ideally in professional practice). Students are directed to "Guidelines for Non-Handicapping Language
  in APA Journals" {http://www.apastyle.org/disabilities.html}. Students should strive to replace the term "Mental
  Retardation" with "Intellectual Disabilities" in oral and written communication in accordance with terminology choices
  in the disability community.
- Be Informed. Negotiating all the requirements for the Master's and/or VA Licensure is extremely complex. It is
  imperative that students schedule a phone or in-person appointment with the Special Education Advisor, (Jancy

  completion of all necessary paperwork in order to graduate on time.

#### **ASSIGNMENTS**

Content Area Unit Plan = 100 points (This is the signature assignment for this course to be placed on TaskStream\* under Standard 7)

This culminating activity (and signature assignment) for this course will demonstrate the student's understanding of the how to plan for, and instruct students with disabilities in a given content area using the Virginia SOLs over at least a 9 week period. An instructional unit plan (sample on Blackboard site) will integrate the following:

- Introduction to the Unit that identifies SOLs to be covered
- Unit Map (follow example in course text, Teaching Content to All)
- Unit Calendar
- Unit Planning Routines (follow examples in course text, *Teaching Content to All*)
- Lesson Map (follow examples in course text, Teaching Content to All)
- Lesson Organizer Routines (follow examples in course text, *Teaching Content to All*)
- Model Lesson Plans that include evidence-based teaching methods and strategies
- Relevant Assessments
- Adaptations/Accommodations for Students with Disabilities (LD, ED, ID), and specific learning strategies from

#### II. Secondary IEP (individual) 30 points

Given a case study of a secondary student with disabilities who is accessing the general curriculum, an appropriate IEP will be developed that includes a present level of educational performance, annual goals and benchmarks, appropriate testing accommodations, parent and student input, and transition planning.

#### III. Secondary Issues Presentation (individual or small group) 30 points

This project will develop understanding of the particular issues or barriers germane to serving secondary students with disabilities. A specific topic (dropping out, substance abuse, need for self-advocacy, block scheduling, case management, etc.) will identify the following:

- a. Issue,
- b. Causes and effects
- c. Potential solutions from the literature.

Students should prepare to verbally summarize this information for the whole class. (approximately 10 minutes)

#### IV. Class Participation - 20 points

Attendance at all classes is required, as is active participation in all assignments, group activities, and class discussions. Active participation includes the asking of questions and the presentation of one's own reflections (often required at the end of each session) regarding the readings and lectures, as well as interactive discussion. Listening and respectful considerations of the comments of others is a professional expectation. Students are to complete the required readings and assignments prior to the relevant class meetings. During each class meeting there will be opportunities to earn required points(s) for successful completion of graded in-class activities that cannot be "made-up" and may affect the student's final grade if missed.

#### V. Quizzes and/or Blackboard Assignments (individual) = 20 points

Quizzes and/or Blackboard discussion assignments will be announced in advance and serve as a measure of what the student currently knows, what the student is learning, and, has learned, as a result of this course.

#### VI. Evidence-Based Secondary Practices (EBPs) "Notebook" = 20 points

Relevant secondary evidence-based practices (RBPs) will be identified and briefly described. In addition, outcomes of the effectiveness of those successfully implemented by the student will also be described. Many of these strategies will be from the Conley text, as well as class discussions.

Using the Conley and Lenz texts as the basis, a "notebook" should be developed that identifies and briefly describes evidence-based strategies from the weekly assigned chapters and other valid sources. The format for reporting these will be found on the Blackboard site for this course. Strategies that the student has actually used in teaching should also be identified.

#### I. Content Area Unit Plan - 100 points

This culminating activity will demonstrate your understanding of the how to plan for, and instruct students with disabilities in a given content area using the Virginia SOLs. Your unit plan will integrate the Unit planning Routine, Lesson Organizer Routines, and specific learning strategies from your required course reading (Teaching Content to All). You will work in a small group for the activity. **Group leader should submit one copy of the Content Area Unit for the group.** 

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9-week unit based on the standards of learning (SOL) for a specific grade and subject at the secondary level –
group work – 70 points

- Introduction (16 points):
  - Select an SOL from any secondary-level curriculum upon which you can base a regular education objective
  - Determine 9-week calendar (Scope and Sequence)
  - Overview of what evidence-based teaching methods and/or strategies will be used in the lesson plans for this unit
  - Determine measurable goals & objectives for sequencing
  - Discussion of how to engage students
- Develop a Unit Calendar
- Develop assessment examples (formative and summative):
  - □ Develop a Unit Test that assesses unit's *stated* objective(s); this serves as your summative assessment.
  - Develop a formative assessment plan to assess effectiveness of teaching and determine "Plan B". In other words, what action(s) will you take as a result of students' progress or lack of progress towards mastering unit's objective(s). (See sample lesson plan template for details.)
- Develop a Unit Map (follow course text)
- Determine instructional decisions that will provide differentiated instruction for students with varying abilities.
  - o Adaptation examples:
    - Given descriptions of students with ED, LD, and ID, identify adaptations/modifications suggested in the text (lectures and elsewhere) that you would need to implement for each student in reading, math, science, social studies, and social skills (etc.).
    - Develop a table or outline that summarizes this material. Use information from the text and from lectures on adaptations and lectures; include source.
- Small group will present their Content Area Unit to the class (schedule TBD).
  - o Should be multi-modal approach
  - o PowerPoint may be utilized
  - o A skit to demonstrate effective teaching is highly recommended as part of the presentation
  - o Plan for a 20 minute presentation, including time for questions/discussion

#### Individually prepared lesson plan – 30 points

- o Develop lesson plan for one week of the unit's 9-week calendar
- o Focus upon students with ED, LD, or ID (group members must ensure that all areas are covered)
- o Determine measurable goals & objectives for sequencing
- o Include differentiation of instruction, outside of class practice,
- o Develop assessment examples (formative and summative):
  - Develop 2 tests/quizzes of at least five-items that assesses unit's stated objective (for the class and/or for specific students). This serves as your summative assessments.
  - Develop 2 formative assessments to assess effectiveness of teaching
  - Adjustment to instructional delivery based upon student performance detailed

As you use the template from the text for your unit plan, this might assist you in working with the template:

#### Directions:

- 1. Make sure the drawing tool bar is visible at the bottom of your screen in the excel document. To do this, go to VIEW in the top menu, scroll down to TOOLBARS, and make sure DRAWING is checked.
- 2. The cells are formatted so that you can click on them and just add text. The larger blank areas require you to use the drawing tools if you want bubbles, lines, and text placed within them.
- 3. To add a bubble, go down to the drawing tool bar and select the circle shape. Go to the area where you want the bubble, click and drag until it is the size you want, and then release your mouse. You can then right click on the shape, change the thickness of the line around it, or format it any way you want.
- 4. To add a line, go down to the drawing tool bar and select the line shape. Go to the area where you want the line, click and drag until it is the size you want, and then release your mouse. You can then right click on the line and format its size, and make it a dotted line if you wish.
- 5. To add a textbox to fit in a bubble or on a line, go down to the drawing toolbar and select the "textbox" tool (it looks like a little piece of paper with an A on it). Go to the area where you want the textbook, click and drag until it is the size you want, and then release your mouse. You can then type in text. When you're finished, right click on the textbox to format the size and font of your text.
