### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Covers biological, behavioral, and sociocultural factors in human sexual behavior.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop a solid basic understanding of biological, social, and psychological components of their human sexuality.
- 2. Form and express educated attitudes and viewpoints on several aspects of human sexuality through the interpretation of readings, lectures, guest speakers, and open discussion with peers.
- 3. Form and express rational and responsible decisions concerning their human sexuality and development.
- 4. Write and discuss the value of human sexuality education with professional teachers as well as the community.

### **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course relies, in part, on the use of explicit visual teaching aids such as slides, films and video clips. These materials may portray nudity, masturbation, and examples of sexual behavior. Every effort is made to present those materials in a mature and scientific manner. A person who would be offended by frank discussions and/or visual portrayals of human sexual behavior may not a good candidate for this class.

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner appropriate to a college classroom. Any student whose behavior is inappropriate or destructive to the learning environment will be asked to leave the class.

- Class attendance is required. Please arrive on time. If a student is unable to attend class, please notify the instructor prior to absence via email.
- Participation is important. Students are expected to come prepared to participate in activities and discussions on assigned readings.

# **Quizzes/Writing Assignments (10 points each – 70 total points)**

Students are expected to attend class and fully participate in class activities and discussions based on the required reading for the week. There will be **10** unannounced quizzes/writing assignments. Only your 7 highest grades will count in your final grade. The quizzes will contain a mixture of multiple choice and true/false questions. The writing assignments will be no longer than one page and will take place in the middle or the end of the class. You will be asked to respond to a specific activity or question in no more than 1 page. There are no make-ups.

# **Documentary Response Paper (15 points)**

Students must watch the documentary, Straight Laced: How Gender Has Us All Tied Up, and write a 2 page response. Students must view the documentary and submit the response by 9/25/13. Students may use class time on Wednesday, 9/18/13 (no class that day) to view the documentary. Grades will be based on content, organization, and grammar/spelling/punctuation.

# Group Presentation (75 points) – Sexual Health Lesson Plan

In groups of 4 or 5, students will develop a sexual health lesson plan for a chosen grade level (K-12). Groups will present an overview of the lesson plan and conduct one activity with the class. Grades will be based on content, presentation skills, and organization and structure. Each person in the group is responsible for a portion of the oral presentation. Presentations will take place on the last day of class. Groups must hand in a copy of the lesson plan. More information will be provided by week 4 on Blackboard.

# Exams (100 points each)

A mid-term and final exam will be given to assess your knowledge and understanding of course materials. Each exam will cover material from the preceding chapters and other required reading as well as class presentations and guest lectures. Exams will be a mix of multiple choice, true/false, matching and short answer. The final exam is not cumulative and will only cover material following the mid-term.
